




Safe Routes Partnership

Celebrated November 14th

- Honors the living legacy of civil rights activist Ruby Bridges
- Encourages youth activism, anti-racism, and anti-bullying



- 1954 Brown vs. Board of Education desegregates schools
- November 14, 1960 Six year old Ruby integrates all-white William Frantz Elementary in New Orleans

 Ruby was met by a mob of angry protestors, but her courage made her a civil rights icon



History of Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day



- Started by fifth grade students in South San Francisco
- Supported by San Mateo County Safe Routes to School program
- 2018 First Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day celebration
- 2021 California State Senate passes a Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day resolution



Ruby Bridge Walk to School Day Mini-Grants



Support a Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day celebration on November 14, 2024

- Grant Application
- Event must take place in November 2024

Project must align with event goals:

- Promote constructive dialogue about activism, racism, and anti-bullying
- Inspire young people to make positive changes in their community



Funding Allotments



Awards distributed based on number of students reached

- \$500 for reaching less than 400 students
- \$1000 for reaching over 400 students



Eligible Applicants



- Local governments
- Public school/system
- Nonprofits with 501c3 status (individuals can partner with community organizations, PTA/Os, etc. with nonprofit status)
- Open to Safe Routes to School programs (cities, schools, districts, counties, and regional entities)
- Community partners (non-profits, libraries, PTA/PTO/caregiver groups, artists)




Funding Ideas

- Incentives and giveaways
- Printing costs posters, handouts, banners
- Supplies for students to make banners, posters
- StoryWalk® supplies
- Stipends for staff/volunteer organizing
- Books about Ruby Bridges, activism, anti-bullying, anti-racism, diversity, equity, and inclusion
- Guest speakers and presentation
- Educational workshops and activities
- Art, photo, or essay contests
- T-shirts, badges, or other commemorative items (bookmarks, pins, wristbands)
- Food and refreshments

- Shows support from elected officials and local leaders
- Increases public buy-in, builds awareness, improves sustainability

Strategy: Contact local media to run a news story

- Spreads awareness, gives neighbors a heads up, promotes key messages around safety and anti-racism




Strategy: Honor local history and advocate for change

- Invite local civil rights leaders, neighbors, community elders
- Elevate traffic safety concerns in the community
- Spark conversations about transportation equity and education equity
- Blogpost: Students in Nashville use Ruby Bridges walk to school day to build awareness about traffic safety




Sustaining the Movement



- Share highlights with community partners
- Social media posts, news clips, videos, photos
- State and regional programs create a Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day webpage
- Create regular opportunities for students to discuss issues that are important to them
- Spin-off celebrations: Organize a walk to school day event for a local hero
- Put Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day in your annual program calendar
